**EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT** 

for the year ended 31 July 2009

During 2008-9 the University of Bath Students' Union (BUSU) continued to embed and implement the excellent procedures and practices developed through our commitment to continued improvement within the SUEI (Students' Union Evaluation Initiative) framework. We remain a leading Students' Union in the UK, and are recognised nationally as a centre of good practice in many areas of student support and development. Particular highlights in the year include;

- Recognition, for the second year running, as one of the top three higher education students' unions in the UK by the National Union of Students (NUS).
- We progressed from a Bronze Award (2007-8) to a Silver Award in the Sound Impact Awards, a national ethical and environmental recognition quality system, for Students' Unions.
- We maintained both our IiP (Investors in People) and our IiV (Investor in Volunteers)
  accreditation.
- We undertook a major Governance Review resulting in a new Governance Structure which is being implemented in 2009-10. 83% of students voting were in favour of these changes.

A key initiative last year was our Engagement Strategy. Led by the sabbatical officers, this proved to be highly successful. One example was that 6,844 students gave us their views on the problems they had encountered with the bus system which helped us to influence and negotiate changes. Along with an improved Research Strategy, the new Engagement Strategy has been a major improvement to our role as the key representation body for students.

The support work we undertake with the University's Academic Representatives was greatly enhanced by the introduction of the on-line elections. This has enabled us to work with departments to advertise the role of academic representatives to the diverse student population. Attendance at our key representative body, Academic Council, rose as a result of the increased commitment by the Academic Representatives and discussions last year ranged from the Timetabling Review to the University Personal Tutor System.

As a result of the findings of our 2007-8 Student Opinion Survey we identified the need to research and address the needs of International Students as part of the University's Internationalisation agenda. We were successful in establishing a joint post with the University International Office to work on an International Student Strategy. The aim was to ensure the Students' Union is more accessible to International Students. The 2008-9 Student Opinion Survey demonstrated that the work we have undertaken has already made an impact on International Students. We also worked with NUS to develop an "Internationalising Your SU" self-audit tool.

Another key group of students we wanted to engage with were the students within the Learning Partnership Organisations. These students now receive regular news updates and have visits from sabbatical officers, who have each been assigned to a number of colleges. We have received very positive feedback regarding our representation of these students.

Over 800 students volunteered to work in the community in 2008-9. These included 305 students who volunteered on 16 different projects as part of Junction 49, an externally funded volunteer scheme, and over 40 students volunteering to work as tutors and mentors in local schools. The Volunteer area also delivered a Multi Cultural Project in conjunction with Bath Spa University and the Student Community Partnership. This project saw International Students delivering sessions on their culture in three schools. The annual Romania Aid Trip where students volunteer in a Romanian Orphanage saw 13 students travel to Romania for a total of 4 weeks. The Bulgaria Aid Trip also ran for the second year. Seven volunteers took part.

In 2008-09 we had 49 sports clubs including the introduction of the Boxing Club. Bath sent a single boxer to the English Universities Championships who won a gold medal with an impressive number of knockouts along the way.

The second ever British Universities Championships in Sheffield once again included a very strong Bath presence with 16 teams representing the University. In total, our teams gained an unprecedented total of 35 Gold, 4 Silver and 7 Bronze medals. Bath continued to hold their 2nd place position within the British Universities Championships for the 7th consecutive year.

2008-09 also saw the Coach Education Scheme grow, not just in the numbers of students gaining qualifications but also in the range of qualifications offered. For the first time the Sports Association ran a course in disability sport offering 20 students the chance to complete a Wheelchair Basketball Leaders' Award Course. This should open the door to increased accessibility for sport at the University of Bath.

Our 80 societies offer opportunities for all their members through a range of trips, events and workshops. A number of our Societies, Arts and Media groups gained national awards and recognition.

The Activities Awards Evening saw the quality of nominations grow to an even higher standard than 2007-08. The 2008-09 awards saw Bath Economics Society (BEST) take the most coveted prize of all in recognition of their outstanding services to their members and their hosting of the Economic Summit at the University.

During 2008-9 we also worked with the University to develop the new Bath Award, which provides students with recognition for their extracurricular activities and achievements as part of their transcript certification. The scheme attracted sponsorship from Santander and in this pilot year 41 students received the award. We also piloted the first Leadership Academy for students in the UK. 20 students undertook training and development sessions in Leadership Skills and put their learning into practice through leading projects that impacted positively on the student, or wider community. The Leadership Academy has now been embedded into the SORTED scheme.

Our nationally recognised Enterprise area went from strength to strength again. This innovative area teamed up with SIFE (Students in Free Enterprise) Cologne to run Student Enterprise 08. Over 130 students attended, 60 from the University of Bath and a further 36 from other UK Universities. One of our students secured £6,000 from SET Squared to provide free transport for the students from Bath to Cologne. Our SIFE team came 4<sup>th</sup> out of over 300 UK Universities in the UK National Competition. They also won the Enterprise Rent-a-Car Business Ethics Award. Coming fourth in the UK competition secured them a place in the Berlin Challenge, a competition between the top four university teams from the UK and Germany.

Our BANTER (Bath Entrepreneurs) group ran the highly successful Business Plan Competition, attracting 112 entries. The winner, a 4<sup>th</sup> Year International Management & Modern Languages student, received £1,000 for his website entitled "UK Students Abroad", designed to help students search for accommodation whilst on placements in Europe.

Electronic voting plays a major part in the Union's democracy strategy. Once again the Students' Union enjoyed an excellent turnout in the Sabbatical elections with one of the highest percentage turnouts in the country. Furthermore, the accessibility of elections generally, has led to increased turnouts in the other online elections held across the year.

During 2008-9 Joblink placed students in over 3000 positions on campus (students may hold more than one job). They also held a successful Student Employee of the Year Competition receiving nominations for students working both on and off campus.

The Academic and Welfare Advice and Representation Centre (AWARE) continue to be the central port of call for students needing welfare and academic advice, and has this year carried out some well-received campaigns. Over 4,440 student visits to the Centre were recorded throughout the year. The principal reasons for visits related to housing problems and academic issues, such as appeals. 18 students volunteered in AWARE to help co-ordinate 8 key campaigns over the year, centred on health, personal safety, and disability awareness.

The commercial services of the Students' Union continue to perform well and provide a vital source of income to enable us to continue to provide the wide range of services, support and activity for our students. The values and ethos which run through the core of our businesses are based on providing a sense of 'community', whilst maintaining the highest levels of quality, value and customer service.

#### **Financial Report**

Overall, the Income and Expenditure Account for the Students' Union shows a net surplus of £125,250 for 2008/2009. During the year £85,007 was received (accounted for as an "Exceptional Item) relating to the overpayment of VAT on retail cost of sales during financial year 2008-9.

Turnover from the Students' Union directly managed trading operations for the year was £4,333,142 with net profit of £556,364. This represents an increase over 2008-9 of 9% and 13% respectively. The vital income stream from all trading outlets assists in the development of many of our Membership Services and upkeep of our Union, with every penny ploughed back into the Students' Union's services and activity areas.

The operation of the 'Fresh' grocery store continues to financially benefit both the University and the Union with a combined return to the University and Students' Union of £272,370. This financial return represents an increase of 22% from 2007-8 with turnover exceeding £2 million for the first time for 2008-9. The store continues to benefit from a partnership with the Co-operative group and, as a result, the promotions and prices available to its own stores. This is a unique arrangement of which the Students' Union is particularly proud as it offers a single logistics solution and adds real value to the store's customers. Fresh also boasts a heavy promotion of Fair Trade goods, and an increasing range of Co-op own label products.

'Costa Coffee' continues to perform particularly well with an increase on 2007-8 of 30% in turnover and 41% in net profit (£115,867 and £58,566 respectively).

"Proper Pasty", a new catering outlet opened in September 2008 proved successful returning a net profit of £17,412 on turnover of £77,903 in the first year of operation

The Balance Sheet continues to reflect a robust financial position for the Union maintaining its ability to respond positively to opportunities as they arise.

#### Statement as to disclosure of information to the auditor

The Executive Committee who were in office on the date of approval of these financial statements have confirmed, as far as they are aware, that there is no relevant audit information of which the auditor is unaware. Each of the Executive Committee have confirmed that they have taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as Executive Committee Members in order to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that it has been communicated to the auditor.

### STATEMENT OF EXECUTIVE RESPONSIBILITIES

for the year ended 31 July 2009

The Executive Committee are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Charity law requires the Executive Committee to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the Executive Committee have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). The financial statements are required by law to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Union and of the surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Executive Committee are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Union will continue in business.

The Executive Committee are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Union. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Union and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### **Risk Management**

BUSU has adopted a formal Risk Management framework that embeds consideration of risk when reviewing the Union's Mission Statement, and developing the Strategic Development Plan within the Annual Planning and Budgeting Process. This approach is designed to directly aid the quality of Executive Committee and management decision-making, improve potential outcomes and provide the clear accountability required to all its members.

A Risk Management Charter exists to:

- formally document the strategies that BUSU follow on behalf of its members to reduce risk over the short and medium term time span;
- confirm that appropriate risk management policies and operational procedures are embedded within the day to day operations of the Union;
- provide a practical framework for the management and staff to follow.

Furthermore, each key risk is assessed and documented in the Risk Register (currently under review) under an appropriate category, and grouped together under additional classifications where relevant.

#### The Risk Register;

- Establishes the key risks within each category;
- Classifies the risks within each category where appropriate:
- Evaluates the likelihood and impact of the key risks and apply a weighting factor:
- Prioritises the risks based on the weighting to determine the most critical risks;
- Plans the response to controlling the risk.

# INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF BATH STUDENTS UNION

We have audited the financial statements on pages 7 to 19.

This report is made solely to the Union's Executive Committee as a body. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the Union's Executive Committee those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Union and the Union's Executive Committee as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

#### Respective responsibilities of Executive Committee and auditors

The Executive Committee's responsibilities for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) are set out in the Statement of Executive Committee's Responsibilities.

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland).

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view. We also report to you whether in our opinion the information given in the Report of the Executive Committee is consistent with the financial statements.

In addition, we report to you if, in our opinion, the Union has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding Executive Committees' remuneration and other transactions is not disclosed.

We read the Report of the Executive Committee and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it.

#### Basis of audit opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the Executive Committee in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Union's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

#### Opinion

In our opinion:

- the financial statements give a true and fair view, in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice, of the state of the Union as at 31 July 2009 and of its surplus for the year then ended; and
- the information given in the Report of the Executive Committee is consistent with the financial statements.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

for the year ended 31 July 2009

#### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Cash flow statement

The Executive Committee has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements.

#### Consolidation

In the opinion of the Executive Committee, the Union and its subsidiary undertaking comprise a small group. The Union has therefore taken advantage of the exemption not to prepare group accounts.

#### Income

The annual grant from the University of Bath is intended to meet recurrent costs and is credited direct to the income and expenditure account. Other income is included in the income and expenditure account on a cash received basis or on a receivables basis where there is reasonable certainty of receipt.

#### Depreciation

Fixed assets are initially recorded at cost and depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:-

Leasehold buildings - 2-15 years
Equipment - 2-5 years
Motor vehicles - 4 years

Expenditure on refurbishments and repairs of assets that are not owned by the Union is expensed in the year.

#### **Stocks**

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

#### Operating lease agreements

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

#### Investments

Investments are stated at cost less any provision for diminution in value.

#### Accounting by charities - Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP)

As a result of its exempt charitable status the Union is not yet required to adopt the SORP in the presentation of the Financial Statements. However, in accordance with the establishment of best practice, where appropriate, the Union will make disclosures in accordance with the SORP.

#### Taxation

No provision is made in these accounts for corporation tax as the Union is exempt from such taxes, as a result of having derived its charitable status from its parent governing body, University of Bath, provided that income is applied for charitable purposes.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (continued) for the year ended 31 July 2009

### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### Pensions

The two principal pension schemes in which the Union participates are the Universities Superannuation Scheme and the Bath & North East Somerset Local Government Pension Scheme, both of which are defined benefit schemes, externally funded and contracted out of the State Earnings-Related Pension Scheme. Both funds are externally valued, normally every three years by professionally qualified independent actuaries using the projected unit method, the rates of contribution payable being determined by the trustees on the advice of the actuaries. In the intervening years, the actuaries review the progress of the schemes. Pension costs are assessed in accordance with the advice of the actuaries based on the latest actuarial valuations of the schemes and are accounted for on the basis of charging the cost of providing pensions over the estimated period during which the Union benefits from the employees' services.

### 25 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Union is an exempt charity for the purposes of the Charities Act 1993 deriving charitable status from its governing parent body, the University of Bath. The Union is in receipt of a recurrent grant from the parent body of £1,021,000 (2008: £1,032,282).

The Union occupies a University building under an informal licence. The Union is charged by the University a contribution to the costs of maintaining the building. The amount charged in the year was £343,000 (2008: £332,282). This is a notional charge to the income and expenditure account for which equivalent income is shown within Note 2 – Grants Receivable.

The University also pays all wages and salaries on behalf of the union and recharges them accordingly.
